Would you like to be a Parish Councillor for Cheddington?

What Do Councillors Do?

- Local councillors are the champions of their community who invest time in local projects and issues to the benefit of residents and the neighbourhood.
- Councillors attend to the local needs of residents, local groups and businesses, make decisions on local services, collaborate with Buckinghamshire Council to adhere to local needs, and progress vital projects to invest in the future of the community.
- Raise matters that the Council can consider and formally decide to act about at meetings.
- Attend Council meetings and regularly monitor emails circulated by the Clerk.
- Make informed contributions which influence the debate on the business that needs to be decided at those meetings.
- Participate in the Council's decision-making process, which is subject to strict rules and guidelines.
- Represent the Council externally.

What Do Councils Do?

Councils lead on community services such as allotments, footpaths, public seating and litter bins, but also larger projects such as the running of local transport, leisure services, youth services and climate change initiatives. These activities are funded by a local tax, called a precept which is determined annually by the parish council.

How Long Does It Take?

NALC's Local Councillor Census Survey found that councillors put aside on average, three hours a week for council work. Council work often includes attending meetings, engaging with residents, and speaking to local groups and bodies on behalf of the council.

Can I stand for Election?

You must be:

- A British citizen, or a citizen of the Commonwealth, or the European Union
- 18 years of age or older
- Live in an area that is served by a local council
- Nomination papers must be hand delivered to a Buckinghamshire Council Deputy Returning Officer at The Gateway, Gatehouse Road, Aylesbury HP19 8FF weekdays between 10am and 4pm from Tuesday 18th March 2025 and no later than Wednesday 2nd April 2025 at 4pm. Previously the Clerk has taken all of the completed nomination papers to the Council offices for checking.

OUR MP's NEWS.

I am delighted to write for this month's edition of the *Cheddington Village Newsletter* as your Member of Parliament for Aylesbury and the villages.

I have continued to be out and about across the villages I represent over the past few months, meeting residents and hearing your priorities.

I have been holding "Meet and Greet" sessions in the villages that form part of Aylesbury constituency, so far in

lvinghoe, Edlesborough and Cheddington. These informal coffee mornings are fantastic opportunities for me to hear residents' feedback and ideas on how I can best support their community, and I really enjoyed the session we held at Cheddington Village Hall.

Parliament returned in January and the Government has been getting on with the work of change. In this column I will highlight two priorities that I think will make a real difference to residents here in Cheddington.

First, we have set out our plans for the NHS, including the plan to clear the backlog of almost 70,000 patients waiting more than 18 weeks for NHS treatment in Aylesbury constituency. With so many people waiting for treatment, it is more urgent than ever that we reform our NHS so it will always be there for you when you need it.

Our Elective Reform Plan sets out a whole system approach to hitting the 18-week referral to treatment target by the end of this Parliament.

This includes opening Community Diagnostic Centres on evenings and weekends so that many more people will be able to access tests and checks while going about their daily lives, and the NHS will also increase the number of surgical hubs, which help protect planned care from the impact of seasonal and other pressures.

The plan will drive forward progress on the government's first steps commitment to deliver 2 million extra appointments in its first year, equivalent to 40,000 every week. The reforms will put patients first, harness technology to support staff and help the NHS to do things more efficiently.

I am pleased that we have provided the biggest boost to GP funding in years – an additional £889m on top of the existing budget for general practice – and set out reforms to cut red tape and bring back the family doctor. We have also made the biggest investment into hospices and end of life care in a generation ensuring that hospices can continue to deliver the highest quality end of life care possible for their patients, families, and loved ones. The Government has announced a £100 million boost for adult and children's hospices to ensure they have the best physical environment for care, and £26 million revenue to support children and young people's hospices.

I am taking a leading role in delivering these reforms as the government's National Health Mission Delivery Champion.

Second, we are taking action on the record levels of illegal sewage dumping we inherited from the last Conservative government.

Our new Water (Special Measures) Bill introduces a significant increase in enforcement powers to end the disgraceful behaviour of water companies and their bosses. Water executives will no longer line their own pockets whilst pumping out this filth. If they refuse to comply, they will face severe penalties including criminal charges.

This Bill is a major step forward in our wider reform to fix the broken water system. The Labour Government will outline further legislation to fundamentally transform how the water industry is run and speed up the delivery of upgrades to our sewage infrastructure to clean up our waterways for good.

Our Trustee Board Chair is dedicated to making sure Scouts runs smoothly, safely, and legally.


We're looking for safe pairs of hands, $\ddot{\tau}$ dotters and $\dot{\tau}$ crossers. Sound like you?

FARMING AND FOOD

The weather does not affect many industries in the way that it affects farming and fishing. However, with global warming, much more serious events are taking place affecting the whole of society here and abroad. Flooding and fires naming just two. Every one of us needs to do what we can for our beautiful world. Just in our locality is a start. When we see heaps of rubbish dumped in gateways we feel very angry and sad. Plastic bags of dog poo are not uncommon! There's no excuse for this. Please report fly tips on fix my street.

British arable farmers have been struggling to get crops planted this autumn and winter. Wheat is a major crop in the UK providing bread flour but also being used in Weetabix, Shreddies and animal food. Barley is grown for malting for beer and feed. We grow oats for porridge and breakfast cereals. Oilseed rape has numerous uses and various flavours are added to the oil. These can all be found at Meads Farm shop. Meanwhile the harvesting of potatoes, sugar beet and carrots plus winter vegetables has been very tricky indeed. When you are out walking the dog on the muddy tracks in driving rain think of these people working to provide our food. Currently lambing has begun and it's a challenge to keep livestock warm and dry.

The Big Farmland Bird Count has taken place in February and is a good way of recording the effect of our conservation schemes currently being initiated by farmers and gamekeepers on their land. This annual event encourages farmers and landowners to record the bird species and numbers on their farms. The British Trust for Ornithology is an interesting charity not as prominent as the Royal Society for Protection of Birds. However, it is a website of great interest, the BTO. In particular the breeding bird survey. They produce maps of bird populations, density and trends. Mammal monitoring too. They are project partners with the RSPB and JNC (Joint Nature Conservation Committee).

Dear Friends

When I look back on the last time I wrote to you it was September. I wrote about dark nights getting longer, folk being isolated. Now its nearly over, spring is on its way. Clocks go forward at the end of the month.

Another year is celebrating itself in Spring, with snowdrops, crocuses, daffodiles, as we yearn towards an early summer and warmth.

Our heads and hearts look forward to it, before that we have Easter, and before that Lent.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, 5 March. (We have 4 services dotted around the Benefice that day.) It lasts 40 days. Lent is primarily identified with the time Jesus spent in the desert fasting, praying, and being tempted. That's why we hear so much about folk giving up things for the period of Lent. Alcohol or chocolate, however, if you don't drink much alcohol or eat a great deal of chocolate is not really cutting it is it? What it's really about is making a difference to your life during this time. For example you might want to commit to taking a couple of hours out each week to concentrate on you, thinking about life, where are you going? Is this what you are really about for the next 30 years? Something that is a bit different from the norm and something that does take commitment.

The Benefice (our 8 Churches) are running a couple of different sessions on Wednesday Evenings during Lent, they both begin on Wednesday 12th March. Dom our fab Rector is running a Zoom course on the Nicene Creed (it's 900 years old this year). Dom has put together some very specialist speakers for these evenings and it should be really good for those of you who have a good understanding of the Christian faith and wanting to go deeper.

Whereas Annie and myself are running Wednesday evenings at Wingrave Church at 7.15 for 7.30pm for those wanting to grasp a little of the Christian faith, we are asking you to dance with us as we talk to each other about where we are coming from and where we might hope to go.

We have food involved and general friendship and chat, we really, really do hope to see you there.

You see, all this before Easter and perhaps before your tulips have blossomed, and when Easter comes, well who knows what we are up to. I look forward to spending my ever emerging year with you, lets go.

A MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER

LENT

Some of the major themes for Lent: Forty days, desert, repentance, discipline, fasting and prayer all have their place in this movement. It is a pilgrimage towards Easter and is one of the most complex of the Christian seasons.

Some people see it as a dreary and dour season. For others it all began when Jesus spent some time in the wilderness. Among the Gospel writers, Mark expresses it most succinctly. Jesus has just been baptised by John in the River Jordan, when the Holy Spirit descended on him like a dove and immediately drove him out into the wilderness. He was in the wilderness for forty days; tempted by Satan; was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him. (Mark 1:12 – 13).



Perhaps the wilderness could be a good place for it is a place of encounter and revelation. 'Wilderness' recalls the place where the People of Israel were 'tested' for 40 years after their exodus from Egypt. Moses also went on a 40 day fast in the wilderness of Sinai (Deuteronomy 9.18) and Elijah a similar fast near Mount Horeb (1 King 19.8). Those were not times of temptation but times of testing. Matthew and Luke present Jesus as one who has passed the test, with his integrity and relationship with the Father intact. The desert becomes a place of growth and grace.

But for others Lent was influenced by the nineteenth century hymn, 'Forty days and forty nights':

Forty days and forty nights thou was fasting in the wild; forty days and forty nights tempted, and yet undefiled. Sunbeams scorching all the day; chilly dew-drops nightly shed; prowling beasts about thy way;

stones thy pillow, earth thy bed.

We also think of 'giving up' or abstaining from certain foods and drink during Lent which echo Jesus' own fasting in the wilderness, leaving him hungry, thirsty and vulnerable to the temptation to turn stones into bread at the end of the 40 days.

However, some scholars and liturgists see more to Lent than sojourn in the desert at the beginning of Jesus's ministry, but a journey to the cross and the empty tomb when it climaxes with those who are baptised at Easter. I am so pleased that Kyle and Jasper will be baptised at Cheddington Methodist Church on Easter Sunday.

Others also believed that in a season that is certainly complex, the wilderness experience is very much part of the tradition. It is a matter of putting the emphasis as much on Lent as following Epiphany as upon Lent preceding Easter. It is even more complex to establish a 40-day season. If Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, we reach Day 40 on Palm Sunday. If we begin on the first Sunday of Lent, sometimes called Quadragesima, we reach Day 40 on Maundy Thursday. But if we eliminate Sundays, because every Sunday celebrates the resurrection, we are back to 40.

With all its complexities we are called to embrace the different layers of Lent whether we think of it as a pilgrimage or journey in the desert that results in encounter, revelation, growth, grace or tradition.



Local author's Book for Charity.

Dunwalkin. Ben Robinson and Michael Portillo aren't the only ones to visit "Villages by the Sea" and embark on "Coastal Journeys". Marsworth resident, Paul Barber, did the same nearly two decades ago. In 2006/7 an elevenmonth continuous circumnavigation of Britain's "outer coast" saw Paul, his partner and Havoc their dog clock up in excess of 5000 miles on their ultimate beating of the bounds. A bit further than The Salt Path (Raynor Winn).

The story now comes to life in the form of a book "dunwalkin" (small d and no g!) Seventeen years in the writing. Having taken that long, perhaps it really ought to be better! That comment some how hints at the book's style, "left field", part memoir, part travel guide.

The book recalls their experience, acknowledges the support they received (have you heard of Hash House Harriers?) Curious? Buy the book!

It speaks of public generosity, being weighed down by donations. At the time £50,000 was raised for Guide Dogs for the Blind and the RNLI.

Traversing some gorgeous scenery and the odd eyesore, enduring all weathers and hardships. Domestic friction was not uncommon. The account is a warts an' all record of the experience and self-analysis.

Over 400 pages made scholarly by referencing others who trailblazed before writing their own accounts (John Merrill, Shally and Richard Hunt, and poignantly Spud Talbot-Ponsonby). What ear worms took root on monotonous sections the "Tracks of My Years" gives this account an added dimension. Beautifully and amusingly illustrated by two local artists, it also includes Havoc's Own Walkies Album of black and white photos.

Paul says "the fondest memory for me was the people we met along the way. We were truly touched by other people's lives. They were unable to commit personally to such a venture but their contribution was to assist us en route. All money raised from the sale of this book will be donated to Guide Dogs. I am not looking to make anything – just pleased I've told the story."
